<b>JOHN EDWARDS</b>	Supports President Bush's call for a guest worker program that would grant legal status to illegal aliens.	Voted to authorize Iraq war in 2003, but now says: "I was wrong". Wants most U.S. troops out of Iraq, but some stationed nearby as a rapid-reaction force.	Wants to raise taxes on Americans making more than \$200,000.
<b>BILL RICHARDSON</b>	Richardson, who was raised in Mexico, wants to grant legal status to illegal aliens. Opposes a border wall as a "terrible symbol between two countries that are friends"	Wants U.S. troops out of Iraq. Unlike Democratic rivals, who would leave some forces in place, Richardson says: "I would leave zero troops behind. Not a single one".	Wants to raise taxes by repealing the Bush tax cuts.
